Fear of death, the role of religion, and common myths about terminal cancer patients are discussed. The second part deals with care and treatment of terminal patients. The significance of attitudes toward

terminal patients, emotional needs of the dying, and the ultimate aloneness of dying are examined. The third part discusses patient advocacy. The role of the professional, staff, and family are presented, and emotional needs of children are identified. The fourth part contains information about termination.
