She examines the way historical movements for racial uplift fail to sustain our quest for self-esteem. Moving beyond a

discussion of race, she identifies diverse barriers keeping us from well-being: the trauma of abandonment, constant shaming, and the loss of personal integrity. In

highlighting the role of desegregation, education, the absence of progressive parenting, spiritual crisis, or fundamental breakdowns in communication between black women

and men, bell hooks identifies mental health as the new revolutionary frontier—and provides guidance for healing within the black community.

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
