Humphrey DeForest Bogart (December 25, 1899 - January 14, 1957) was an American actor. He is widely regarded as a cultural

icon. The American Film Institute ranked Bogart as the greatest male star in the history of American cinema. After trying various jobs, Bogart began acting in 1921 and became a regular in Broadway productions in the 1920s and 1930s. When the stock market crash of 1929 reduced the demand for plays, Bogart turned to film. His first great success was as Duke Mantee in *The Petrified Forest* (1936), and this led to a period of typecasting as a gangster with films such as *Angels with Dirty Faces* (1938) and B-movies like *The Return of Doctor X* (1939). His breakthrough as a leading man came in 1941, with *High Sierra* and *The Maltese Falcon*. The next year, his performance in *Casablanca* raised him to the peak of his profession and, at the same time, cemented his trademark film persona, that of the hard-boiled cynic who ultimately shows his noble side. Other successes

followed, including *To Have and Have Not* (1944), *The Big Sleep* (1946), *Dark Passage* (1947) and *Key Largo* (1948), with his wife Lauren Bacall; *The Treasure of the Sierra Madre* (1948); *The African Queen* (1951), for which he won his only Academy Award; *Sabrina* (1954) and *The Caine Mutiny* (1954). Even though they did not appear in a large number of films together, the popularity and cultural significance of these films solidified the status of "Bogie and Bacall" as one of the premier romantic couples in film history. When Bogart died in 1957, Bacall was still in her 30s, yet from 1957 onward her name scarcely

surfaces in popular culture, as though Bacall was simply wiped away with her late husband. In fact, it often comes as a great surprise to people that Bacall is still alive and well as she nears her 90th birthday.
