The utopias envisioned by Edward Bellamy and other novelists late in the nineteenth century were generally blueprints of government. As satellites of men, women were expected to share in the general improvement of society. The resurgence of the feminist movement since the late 1960s has produced a very different kind of utopian literature. Frances Bartkowski explores a body of work that is striking and vital because it reflects the hopes, fears, and desires of women who have glimpsed the possibilities of a bright new world freed from stifling patriarchal structures. *Feminist Utopias* is a comparative study of the utopian fiction of nine women writers in the United States, France, and Canada. Except for Charlotte Perkins Gilman's *Herland* (1915), the prototype for feminist literary utopias, all of the works were published between 1969 and 1986. Bartkowski discusses Monique Wittig's *Les Guérillères*, Joanna Russ's *The Female Man*, Marge Piercy's *Woman on the Edge of Time*, Suzy McKee Charnas's *Motherlines*, Christine Rochefort's *Archaos*, ou le jardin étincelant, E. M. Broner's *A Weave of Women*, Louky Bersianik's *The Eugelionne*, and two dystopian novels, Charnas's *Walk to the End of the World* and Margaret Atwood's *The Handmaid's Tale*.

Increasingly influenced by globalised economic and social institutions, both countries have come to face crises that have made people insecure in the present and anxious about the future.

Many of these seminal essays are long out of print and hard to find. This timely volume makes Marc Raeff's insights readily available as Russia

reemerges as a nation-state facing "new" challenges that are often deeply rooted in its past.

Organized Time is the first attempt to unite theories of harmony, rhythm and meter, and form under a common idea of structured time. Building off of recent advances in music theory in essential subfields—rhythmic theory, tonal structure, and the theory of musical form—author Jason Yust demonstrates that tonal music exhibits similar hierarchical organization in each of these dimensions. Yust develops a network model for temporal structure with an application of mathematical graph theory, which leads ultimately to musical applications of a multi-dimensional polytope called the associahedron. A wealth of analytical examples includes not only the familiar tonal canon—J.S. Bach, Mozart, Schumann—but also lesser known masters of the musical Enlightenment such as C.P.E. and J.C. Bach, Boccherini, and Johann Gottlieb Graun. Yust's approach has wide-ranging ramifications across music theory, enabling new approaches to musical closure, hypermeter, formal function, syncopation, and rhythmic dissonance, as well as historical observations about the development of sonata form and the innovations of Haydn and Beethoven. Making a forceful argument for the independence of musical modalities and for a multivalent approach to music analysis, *Organized Time* establishes the aesthetic importance of structural disjunction, the conflict of structure in different modalities, in numerous analytical contexts.

What does falling in love have in common with the fall of the Berlin Wall? Or the fall of the Twin Towers? In the light of postmodernism's programmatic critique of a humanist notion of the subject and an emphatic understanding of events, *Subject of the Event* shows that selected American novels after 2000 offer an alternative to the "death of the subject." As the first book to comprehensively engage with Alain Badiou's writings outside of a philosophical context, *Subject of the Event* analyzes five critically acclaimed novels of the new millennium—Cormac McCarthy's *The Road* (2006), Jess Walter's *The Zero* (2006), Mark Z. Unlike a humanist capability of having agency, reagency is defined as a repetitive subjective praxis that is contingent upon events, which is given a concrete literary form in the novels under investigation. Sebastian Huber explores how the American penchant for events ("new beginnings," "clean slates," "apocalypse") is being critically dealt with in the novels at hand, while still offering an emphatic idea of singular disruptions that open up ways for subjects to affirm and become empowered by the new propositions of these happenings.
