The volume concludes by looking to the future of peacebuilding scholarship and the possibilities for new growth and progress. The spiritual universe of African Muslim women may be one where Islam is not the source of their problems or their legislative and political activity, but a spiritual activity that can exist devoid of activist or political forms.
