I then focus on the successes and challenges with the implementation of the African Youth SDGs Summit. This chapter paints a picture to any young person that there are no excuses in working towards the implementation of any social initiative. In chapter two, I share the practical steps in getting started with an

idea or initiative. I give a step-by-step approach in setting objectives and goals as well as defining clear engagement modules in order to attract the right people to journey with. I also share how to craft a working budget and a concept note to sell your idea the best way possible. In all these, I picked from the African Youth SDGs Summit experience. In chapter three, I look at building traction and mobilizing multi-stakeholder support towards an initiative. Partnership is key and the entire SDGs is anchored on multi-stakeholder partnerships. I give some practical steps and avenues for building and sustaining professional partnerships, picking from the African Youth

SDGs Summit and how YAG has been going about it. Chapter four is where I touch on moving the idea into proper implementation. I share the idea of piloting and how we did it at the African Youth SDGs Summit. Critical steps in reporting and evaluation including financial reporting and auditing were central in this chapter. Also, I share information about a very important skill that is dear to me—debt management. The last chapter looks at fostering continuity and sustaining the initiative. I pointed out people and plans as the key elements of achieving sustainability for any initiative.

Over the last two decades, globalisation

has accelerated international migration flows, particularly of skilled labour. Yet increasing migration by skilled workers from developing countries («brain drain») has raised serious concerns internationally about the adverse development impact on their countries of origin. This book, however, highlights the positive aspects of skilled labour migration as scientific diasporas are playing a growing role in the transfer of technology, skills and knowledge («brain gain») to their home countries. This is a very significant development in a globalised world where science, technology and knowledge can trigger economic and social transformations. The book presents

solid empirical evidence of the contributions scientific diasporas make to their countries of origin, based on primary surveys of skilled migrants from Colombia, India and South Africa employed in Switzerland, a major destination country. The findings lead to a better understanding of the motives for migration, the profile of the scientific diaspora communities in Switzerland, and the varied ways in which they help their home countries. The book makes a significant contribution to the international policy debate and dialogue on migration and development. In particular, it shows how to leverage the potential of scientific diasporas as agents of

home country development, by identifying good practices and offering specific recommendations for the countries of origin and of destination. Islam and Politics in East Africa UN "This paper presents a survey experiment in South Africa that focuses on the role of mobilization for demand for redistribution. Previous literature has found that providing information on inequality raises concerns about inequality but need not lead to a change in tax preferences. We argue that mobilization might provide the missing link between information and political behavior regarding demand for redistribution. We

operationalize mobilization from an individual perspective as the belief that a decrease in inequality is feasible. If this belief is absent, information about inequality might simply increase the pessimism of respondents and remain inconsequential for policy preferences. We test this idea with a survey experiment in two townships of Cape Town, which includes one pure information and two mobilization treatments. The first mobilization treatment informs respondents about the (much lower inequality) in neighboring countries. The second provides elite support for redistribution via video messages of South African leaders. Consistent with previous literature, we

find that pure information on inequality increases concern for inequality but has no effects on tax preferences. Mobilization treatments, in contrast, shake the belief that a decrease in inequality is feasible and consequently lead to a change in tax preferences. While the mechanism regarding information on lower inequality in neighboring countries is as expected, the one for the videos is puzzling: videos make people believe that inequality is more, instead of less, inevitable, and this leads to lower tax preferences. We conjecture that this is due to a lack of credibility of the leaders considered which makes viewers

more pessimistic and has a demobilizing effect."--Page 1.
