Roosevelt died in April 1945 and was succeeded by Truman. Churchill lost the general election to Attlee in July.

Stalin alone provided continuity throughout the conferences of the Big Three, and immediately beyond. The book explores the power of these individuals, asking such questions as: - To what extent did the leaders exert their own influence and to what extent could they be considered to be spokesmen for their countries? - How significant was it that Truman and Attlee had less colourful
