It was the first book to show clearly the close relationship between mathematics and formal logic. Starting from a minimal number of axioms, Whitehead and Russell display the structure of

both kinds of thought. No other book has had such an influence on the subsequent history of mathematical philosophy. An example of Russell's early thought, the work took particular inspiration from the letters to
