This book offers a historical analysis of key classical translated works for children, such as writings by Hans Christian Andersen and Grimms' tales. Translations dominate the earliest history of texts written for children in English, and stories translated from other languages have continued to shape its course to the present day. Lathey traces the role of the translator and the impact of translations on the history of English-language children's literature from the ninth century onwards. Discussions of popular texts in each era reveal fluctuations in the reception of translated children's texts, as well as instances of cultural mediation by translators and editors. Abridgement, adaptation, and alteration by translators have often been viewed in a negative light, yet a closer examination of historical translators' prefaces reveals a far more varied picture than that of faceless conduits or wilful censors. From William Caxton's dedication of his translated History of Jason to young Prince Edward in 1477 ('to thentent/he may begynne to lerne read Englishsh'), to

Edgar Taylor's justification of the first translation into English of Grimms' tales as a means of promoting children's imaginations in an age of reason, translators have recorded in prefaces and other writings their didactic, religious, aesthetic, financial, and even political purposes for translating children's texts.

Of all the theatrical genres most prized by the Victorians, pantomime is the only one to have survived continuously into the twenty-first century. It remains as true today as it was in the 1830s, that a visit to the pantomime constitutes the first theatrical experience of most children and now, as then, a successful pantomime season is the key to the financial health of most theatres. Everyone went to the pantomime, from Queen Victoria and the royal family to the humblest of her subjects. It appealed equally to West End and East End, to London and the provinces, to both sexes and all ages. Many Victorian luminaries were devotees of the pantomime, notably among them John Ruskin, Charles Dickens, Lewis Carroll and W.E. Gladstone. In this vivid and evocative account of the Victorian pantomime, Jeffrey Richards examines the potent combination of slapstick, spectacle and subversion that ensured the enduring popularity of the form. The secret of its success, he argues, was its continual evolution. It acted as an accurate cultural barometer of its times, directly reflecting current attitudes, beliefs and preoccupations, and it kept up a flow of instantly recognisable topical allusions to political rows, fashion fads, technological triumphs, wars and revolutions, and society scandals. Richards assesses throughout the contribution of writers, producers, designers and stars to the success of the pantomime in its golden age. This book is a

treat as rich and appetizing as turkey, mince pies and plum pudding.

The revised literacy strategy has a particular focus on speaking and listening and this resource offers sound advice about where to turn for help. Issues such as more serious behavioural issues, such as ADHD, are also tackled in depth. Whether they need to manage unruly pupils or just work more effectively with their class as a whole, the exercises presented here will give teachers plenty of scope to work drama into their lessons. This is one of a series of pantomimes and shows from TINSEL TURMOIL PRODUCTIONS. Each script contains about a dozen main characters and there are suggestions for set pieces, music, dance etc to allow the purchaser the chance to use as many people as they want! There are no performance fees and the script can be adapted within reason to bring in any local names or people if required. Enjoy! The show could open with a dance, creating a suitable scene (Arabian?). The GUARD calls proceedings to order but is immediately interrupted by the GOOD FAIRY and ABANAZAR (the wicked uncle/aunt - rather like Cruella de Ville?) who go into battle with Aladdin and his magic lamp. A SET PIECE brings us the MARKET SCENE before children spin the pantomime dame (WIDOW TWANKEY) round and cause chaos in the street. Abanazar meets the old widow and starts to plot her wicked scheme to get rich and powerful. Aladdin and his friends Wishy and Washy cause more mayhem as the Royal Party approach the market square. Aladdin and the Princess fall hopelessly in love! But Aladdin is too poor for a Princess. Abanazar gets nastier with the audience as the scene changes to a SET PIECE in the LAUNDERETTE. Various customers next come to complain and amongst them is this year's craze - BOB the BUILDER. He is banned from the panto! Everything looks bad for the Widow and Aladdin until Abanazar enters the shop and says she is the long lost

sister of Aladdin's father! Abanazar tricks Aladdin into coming with him up the mountain to where treasure and a magic lamp are hidden. SET PIECE : up the mountain. Aladdin is trapped in the cave of jewels. Abanazar leaves him to die. Who could possibly get through the rock and rescue Aladdin? Yes, Bob the builder.... in fact about 30 of them - all called Bob and all dancing their way into the show. Aladdin returns home with the genie of the lamp and then gains a second genie (of the ring). The Good fairy rushes the story on for us and Abanazar tricks the Princess into parting with the magic lamp. She then whisks them away from Aladdin and only the magic carpet SET PIECE can bring the story to a happy ending. Abanazar is banned to Albert Square and the others all live happily after!
