Bei der Recherche zu Mozart fällt auf, dass er in seiner Laufbahn zahlreiche Werke für Klavier und vergleichsweise wenig Stücke für die Violine komponierte. Im Bezug auf die Violine ist 1775 ein besonderes Jahr, da Mozart sich in dieser Zeit intensiv mit der

Gattungsreihe der Konzerte befasste und innerhalb diesen Jahres wahrscheinlich vier von fünf ihm sicher zugeschriebenen Violinkonzerte vertonte. Ziel dieser Arbeit ist daher, den Stellenwert der Violine für Mozart in der Entstehungszeit der Konzerte zu ergründen und zu analysieren, wie er das Instrument und dessen Besonderheiten bei den Violinkonzerten einsetzte.
