narratological, feminist, sociocultural, stylistic. In an appendix, the volume editor, who was a friend of the author, provides a new translation of Martín Gaité's only autobiographical sketch, alongside the original Spanish.

Springer Anne Duden's reputation as one of the most innovative writers of her generation, established in 1982 with the experimental stories in *Übergang*, was confirmed in 1985 by *Das Judasschaf*, a novel interweaving an individual's anguish with the cultural trauma of the German past.
