This guide also has tax tables you need to figure the taxes to withhold from each employee for 2017. References to

"income tax" in this guide apply only to "federal" income tax. Contact your state or local tax department to determine if their rules are different. When you pay your employees, you don't pay them all the money they earned. As their employer, you have the added responsibility of withholding taxes from their paychecks. The federal income tax and employees' share of social security and Medicare taxes that you withhold from your employees' paychecks are part of their wages that you pay to the United States Treasury instead of to your employees. Your employees trust that

you pay the with-held taxes to the United States Treasury by making federal tax deposits. This is the reason that these withheld taxes are called trust fund taxes. If federal income, social security, or Medicare taxes that must be withheld aren't withheld or aren't deposited or paid to the United States Treasury, the trust fund recovery penalty may apply. See section 11 for more information. Pub. 15-A includes specialized information supplementing the basic employment tax information provided in this publication. Pub. 15-B, Employer's Tax Guide to Fringe Benefits, contains information about the employment tax treatment and valuation of various types of non-cash compensation.  No one likes paying taxes, much less the  
 process of filing tax returns. For years,

 the most common misconceptions and  
 closes with suggestions for how the  
 current system could be substantially

simplified to better serve its civic

This publication covers the special tax  
 situations of active members of the U.S.  
 Armed Forces. For federal tax purposes,  
 the U.S. Armed Forces in-cludes  
 commissioned officers, warrant officers,  
 and enlis-ted personnel in all regular and  
 reserve units under control of the  
 Secretaries of the Defense, Army, Navy,  
 and Air Force. The U.S. Armed Forces  
 also includes the Coast Guard. The  
 Public Health Service and the National  
 Oce-anic and Atmospheric  
 Administration can also receive many of  
 the same tax benefits. The U.S. Armed  
 Forces doesn't include the U.S. Merchant  
 Marine or the American Red Cross.  
 Members serving in an area designated  
 or treated as a combat zone are granted  
 special tax benefits. In the event an area  
 ceases to be a combat zone, the IRS will  
 do its best to notify you. Many of the  
 relief provisions will end at that time.
